- 3. Compare how you are inspired by the sacrifice and pride Americans show by still waving the flag during tumultuous times. (Think about difficult times when you have witnessed Americans pulling together, showing pride, and making sacrifices by coming together as a nation. Explain and describe.

III. Body Paragraph 2

A. **Topic Sentence:** In addition, the "National Anthem" helps us build pride in our country and unifies us as a nation.

- 5. Use second and third level supporting details.
- 6. An effective ending to wrap up the writing.
- 7. Correct sentences, punctuation, and spelling.
- 8. At least one direct quotation. (REMEMBER: If you are quoting someone, a comma must be placed after the speaker before the direct quote; the first word of the direct quote is capitalized, and all punctuation occurs inside the quotation marks.
- 9. Sentences started with prepositional phrases, present participles, or subordinate conjunctions to attain <u>complex sentences</u>.
- 10. Use sensory details to relate the event and convey the dominant emotion.
